

Aim

The Trust's objective is to provide shareholders with growth in capital and income over the long term through investment in a diversified portfolio of UK equities. The Trust invests mainly in the shares of FTSE 100 companies, although its portfolio also includes some medium-sized and smaller UK companies.

Risks & Features

Investment trusts are quoted companies listed on the London Stock Exchange. Their share prices are determined by factors including the balance of supply and demand in the market, which means that the shares may trade below (at a discount to) or above (at a premium to) the underlying net asset value.

The Trust seeks to enhance returns for its shareholders through gearing, in the form of bank borrowings. Gearing can boost the Trust's returns when investments perform well, though losses can be magnified when investments lose value.

History

The launch of the Trust in December 2001 followed offers to holders of Loan Notes issued by Lafarge Minerals Ltd (former shareholders of Blue Circle Industries PLC) and Shoppoal Ltd (former shareholders of Fairbar Ltd, which was de-merged from Whitbread plc), effectively to exchange their Loan Notes for Ordinary shares. In addition, Ordinary shares were available through a Placing and Offer for Subscription by Cazenove. The Trust has issued new shares on subsequent occasions at the planned wind-up dates of other quoted investment trusts and also in exchange for loan notes issued in cash takeovers.

Fund Manager's Review

After a strong opening to the new decade, the equity market sold off sharply in the final weeks of January 2010 to finish the month down 3.6%. The British Portfolio Trust outperformed the market driven by the underweight position in the mining and banking sectors and continued strong performance from Energy XXI. The initial trigger for the sell off was banking regulation where President Obama proposed a levy on US banks and a separation of certain trading activities. More significant, however, was the Chinese authorities tightening of lending policy to slowdown credit growth. The central theme of our investment strategy for 2010 is one of caution over the impact on all investment markets of a gradual move to reduce the stimulus provided globally in the aftermath of the credit crisis. Concerns over Greece, Portugal and Spain are symptomatic of a withdrawal of liquidity which tends to reveal tensions within economies and markets.

We have been positioning British Portfolio Trust for a few months for such a move to a policy tightening phase by adding more defensive investments, selling mining stocks and reducing gearing. During January we sold Prudential and SAB Miller, both exposed to emerging markets which have driven their share prices over the last twelve months, and started a new position in Associated British Foods. ABF is the owner of Primark, the discount fashion retailer as well as an array of food businesses such as British Sugar and Twinning's. The business has been investing heavily for a number of years now and is on the cusp of a period of higher return on capital, better cash generation and profit growth.

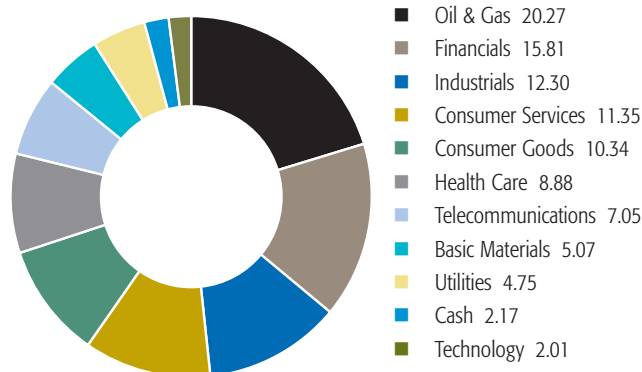

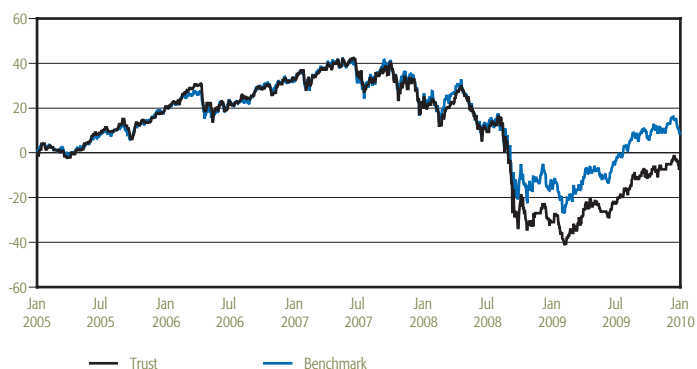
