

Aim

The Trust's objective is to deliver capital and income growth through investment in a focused portfolio of European securities.

Risks & Features

Investment trusts are quoted companies listed on the London Stock Exchange. Their share prices are determined by factors including the balance of supply and demand in the market, which means that the shares may trade below (at a discount to) or above (at a premium to) the underlying net asset value.

Investment trusts can enhance returns through gearing. This can boost a Trust's returns when investments perform well, though losses can be magnified when investments lose value.

History

The Trust was formed as part of the reorganisation of its predecessor, Charter European Trust plc in 2002. It was launched primarily to enable existing shareholders to rollover their investment and it follows a similar investment strategy. On 5th January 2007 shareholders voted to adopt a new benchmark index, the FTSE World Europe (ex UK), and to change the Trust's name from Charter Pan-European Trust plc to Charter European Trust plc.

Fund Manager's Review

January was a negative start for equity markets retracing some of the gains seen since last March. Risk aversion returned to the markets as sovereign risk worries in the peripheral countries hit the headlines. The Greek budget deficit, which at 12.7% of GDP is the largest in Europe, came under intense scrutiny with many investors speculating that the EU would be forced to aid Greece in reducing their deficit to within the 3% of GDP limit set by the EU. The cost of insuring Spanish and Portuguese debt against default also soared, with Spain unveiling plans to cut their budget deficit by two thirds in an attempt to avoid a similar fate to the Greek economy. In addition to this, The People's Bank of China raised the yield on its three month bills and increased its interest rates for the first time since the rate was cut in December 2008 to try and slow lending growth. Amidst the indifferent macro news, recent quarterly results were positive with a majority of companies beating market consensus via margin improvement rather than just via cost cutting, suggesting that the outlook for many industries is beginning to improve.

The portfolio performed ahead of its benchmark in this downward market with the overweight positions in technology and healthcare beneficial. The best performers within the portfolio were German market research company GfK, French listed advertising company Publicis and French satellite operator Eutelsat. GfK announced acquisition plans to expand into Emerging markets, while Publicis was upgraded by numerous brokers ahead of their Q4 results in mid February amid expectations of a share buy back. The worst performers within the portfolio were German exchange operator Deutsche Boerse after writedowns in its US Equity options business and Societe Generale. Portugal Telecom also performed poorly amidst fears for the Portuguese economy.

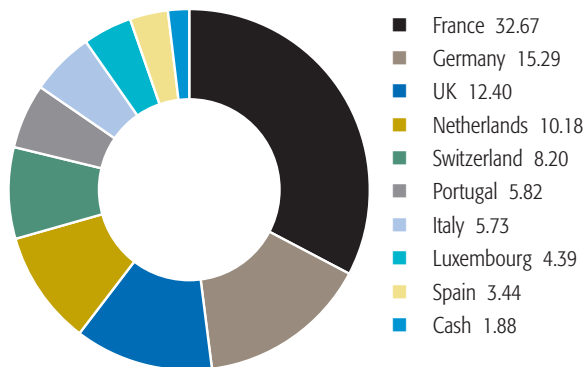

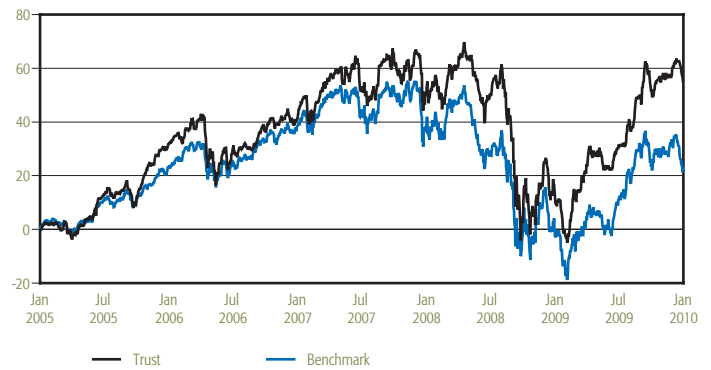
